The blurb on the cover reads as follows:

#### **Podcast Recommendations**

Podcasts are free to listen on apps or websites using your mobile phone or computer. I use Spotify and find it very easy and free. If you are interested in listening to a podcast or two, the ones I have found and enjoyed are as follows. (to find these on Spotify or your favourite podcast provider, just type in the name of the podcast and hit search).

**Lore** – Lore is a bi-weekly podcast that has also been turned into a TV show and book series about dark historical tales. Each episode explores the mysterious creatures, tragic events, and unusual places that fill the pages of our history. Some of these tales can be a little terrifying, but I found them to be interested as he explains the origins of some of our folk lore such as Vampires, Monsters and alike. Not for the feint hearted but you will learn a lot.

**The Scottish history podcast** – The Scottish history podcast is a podcast dedicated to all things Scottish History by an experienced Scottish tour guide. This one is great if you only want short explanations of history. Hosted by Owen Innes, he researches his topics thoroughly providing a glance at the important events that moulded Scotland as we know it today.

**Thistle Do Nicely** – This podcast is brought to you by a group of three longtime friends and displaced Scotsmen, who get together to talk about their homeland, the weird stuff that happens there and to remind us why the Scottish are the way they are. The men have a great banter as they discuss history, food, folk lore, traditions, and customs of the Scottish people. I personally recommend this one if you enjoy a good laugh as you listen to the 45 minutes of banter between three very good friends. this podcast was created through the covid lockdown and only 100 episodes available.

**Stories if Scotland** – Stories of Scotland is an award-winning Scottish history podcast. The hosts aim to unravel the rich tapestry of Scotland's culture, nature, and heritage. Prepared to climb into caves, cairns, and chaos as they travel around Scotland and investigate how stories of the past can help ups make sense of the modern world.

#### The Wild Heather of Scotland

We have all heard of Scotland's national flower. But how many of you know much about it? If you google "Heather of Scotland", there are many results showing a multitude of photos. Some of which I will share with you now.

There are three species of heather you will find, all of which contribute to the purple scenes. All three



are short-leaved evergreen plants with purple or pink flowers, but when they are seen together the common heather is easy to pick out on account of its flowers' shape. As you can see in the photo below to the right, cross-leaved heath and bell heather have bell-like flowers concentrated in a clump at the top of the stems. The flowers are actually made up of four petals, but these are fused together to form a tube, and this is what gives it the distinctive bell appearance. Common heather's flowers are arranged in a wider distribution along the stem, and they have distinct petals that give them a more familiar 'open flower' appearance. The flower colour is a tell-tale sign too. The heath species tend to be more noticeable as individuals or small patches, where their large and lurid flower heads draw the eye in otherwise uniformly coloured landscapes.



**Historically**, heather has been used for many purposes including as fuel, fodder, building materials, thatch, packing and ropes. It was also once used to make brooms which is how it got its Latin name: Calluna is derived from the Greek word meaning 'to brush'. Heather ale was made in Scotland for thousands of years — archaeologists have found traces of an alcoholic drink made from heather on shards of pottery more than 3,000 years old!

Heather is also known as 'Ling' and is an abundant plant on

heathland, moors, bogs and even in woodland with acidic or peat soils. Its delicate pink flowers appear from July to October and are a contrast to the tough, wiry, sprawling stems they grow upon. Plants grow tightly packed together and can live for up to 40 years. it can grow up to 90cm tall and can be seen all year round, flowering in the Autumn months with the best time to see it in August.



**Did you know?** While Heather is common in Scotland and England, when found in Australia it is considered a weed because it is a highly adaptable plant, capable of growing across a broad range of altitudes, soil types and environmental conditions. Each plant can produce thousands of seeds annually, and it is possible that individual seeds may remain viable for up to one hundred years. These seeds are tiny and easily spread, and once heather becomes established in an ecosystem, it is capable of rapid growth which can quickly out-compete all native plants within the area. Heather infestations are promoted by fire, which encourages seeds in the soil to sprout profusely, allowing this plant pest to gain even more ground.
